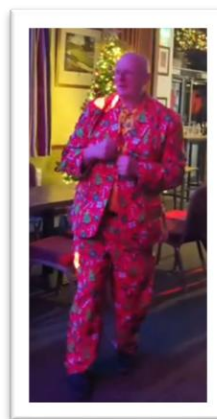

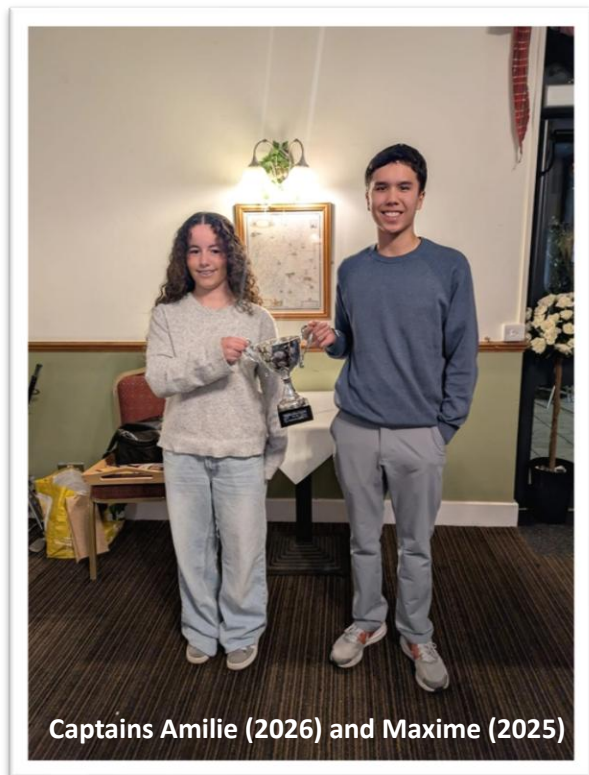

COMPLEX Q&A

Summary of my monthly meeting held with Downshire Complex

Date 01 December 2025

Q&A between Mark (EGC Capt) and Simon (Downshire GM)

It is perceived that EA are not investing in the course, that money is going to other parts of the EA business, can you comment

It's true that Downshire is part of a bigger wheel, but we get our fair share of investment. It's only 18 months ago that EA invested £300k on the driving range to protect revenue and offer a better experience, more drainage works have been carried out in the past 48 months than over the past 12 years. But there is a misconception that running a golf course is a license to print money. Generally, there are times in the year that the course runs at a loss i.e. between about November and February inclusive, then this is hopefully made back through the main golf season.

Before EA took over, Downshire and other leisure sites ran at a loss for several years. This is why BFC entered into partnership with EA to make Bracknell's leisure facilities more sustainable and profitable and keep them better maintained. I'd love for every penny to be able to be spent on the course, but this just isn't viable. In the past 24 months new boilers were needed for the clubhouse, all the old draughty doors were replaced, the external paintwork required doing and lights including the carpark were upgraded, as you can imagine these works ran comfortably into six figures.

Budgets and CAPEX are completed not only for next year, but we also look ahead on a 5 year long term rolling investment taking sustainability into account.

With regards to the maintenance of the course, who does what? where does the responsibility lie?

The property & machinery are owned by the council (still). EA is responsible for reactive maintenance and upkeep (annual service of equipment alone cost £18-20K). If assets need replacing e.g. green keeping equip, or a tree needs felling, etc then this is generally the responsibility of the council.

Health and safety / duty of care to the public (& members) lies with EA, for example: sometimes due to condition of the course buggies/ride-ons need to be prohibited. Not that they damage the grass - it is more to do with safety around the course in adverse conditions - over bridges and around ditches etc.

The bridges are clearly slippery at this time of year, what is being done to keep them as safe as possible?

We are regular clearing them, but it is an endless task at the moment. Anti slip strips have been purchased and are ready to be added to the bridges asap. Arched bridge over ditch near 11th tees will likely be roped off now as this is particularly hazardous when wet.

[MP: watch your footing out there - it's slippery when wet!]

I am regularly hearing that the mats and rubber tees are not in good condition. What is being done?

The mats were recently power hosed to clean them up but agree they need to be regularly checked. I had asked the rangers to do this but will reinforce the message to check all mats daily and ensure rubber tees are functioning (replaced if damaged or clean out broken tees as necessary)

[MP: Simon sent this instruction out while I was there]





How is the new drainage work progressing? How is it holding up in the rain?

Firstly, we need to complete the drainage work. The primary drainage has been completed on 13 and 16.

The 13th upper fairway is now going to be "**gravel banded**". This injects slits with a 30cm column of pea shingle into the fairway at approx. 1m gaps, rows are perpendicular to the primary drainage. This allows water to flow easier through the (compact) soil to the drains.

The gravel banding work is to be done in January. The cost of doing this just on the top end of the 13th is about £4500 and is a cost-effective investment for the Proof of Concept to allow the surface 3 inches to drain more quickly. If successful it will also be extended to the 16th fairway (to support the new drainage that has just been completed) hopefully in February.

Overall - this year is already drier than last year (although may not feel like it). In 2024 the course had already been closed 5 times by end of November due to the wet conditions. This year it has not closed once yet and buggies were out until the first week of November, personal ride-ons were still allowed up to the writing of this report.

[MP: With the new drainage and a hopefully less wet climate this winter, I hope we get to play more golf this winter 😊]

Apart from leaves, worm casts are our favourite subject at this time of year. Given that the “worm killer potions” are banned, is there anything that you can do that might improve the situation?

[MP: The main chemical product used on golf courses to deter worms, **Carbendazim**, was banned for use in the UK and EU around **2017**. After about two years any left in the soil would have deteriorated. The worms have therefore been “unchecked” for probably about 5+ years now – making it worse for us. Currently with no approved replacement, only a few options are available – primarily improve drainage & use soil conditioners (e.g. sulphur-based products) to lower soil PH]

The fairways have been tested for the acidity level - worms don't like acidic soil. The soil has been shown to be PH neutral, or slightly alkaline. To combat this and make it slightly acidic, which won't affect the grass - (it will just look dark and lush for a while) - we are putting down iron sulphate solution. This is a reasonably cheap and environmentally friendly option.

This is going to be tested on the 4th fairway.

[MP: The hope is that the worms will pack their bags and leave the area!]

We will also monitor the 13th with the gravel banding to see if that helps reduces worm casts by lowering the water saturation in the soil in that area. I am also requesting another “winter” robot demo for cutting of the fairways which will also hopefully reduce the smearing of casts on the fairways. If positive we will be looking at this investment in April.

We would like to see the approaches and surrounds of the greens improved - getting bad lies when just missing the green seems unfair.

This is not being helped by the wormcasts either – All mowers have front rollers which smears the worm casts. Hoping if we can get the wormcasts under control this will improve. Also working with John [head greenkeeper] to address the “shrinking green” issues as we move into the spring.

[MP: we can all help by not taking ride-ons & trollies near the greens]

Footnote:

A few months ago, most golfers were praising the course and its condition with numerous people making the effort to speak to the Greenkeeping team to thank them, then something happened... Autumn and Winter.

They're the same team that delivered the prolonged playing season this year in very difficult drought conditions and are still working hard through all weathers daily to try and maintain the course. There are no affordable miracles to the wet surfaces or to stop leaves falling from trees, we just have to do our best, continue with our drainage endeavours and sometimes prioritise one job over another.

We do however listen when people approach us in a professional manner, we try to get the things done that are important to you, like the new bridge on 13, reducing the lip on the 14th bunker, purchasing a power brush to try and reduce the mud from paths and bridges and redefining the out of bounds on 13.

Please remember that not all money spent will be visual on the course but will always be for the betterment of the complex. Some things are however outside of our control, but I'll always listen to suggestions and answer where I can.

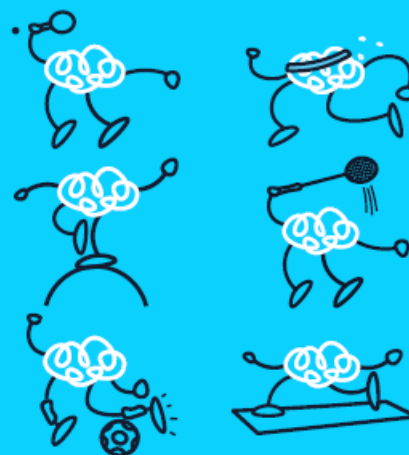
